<b>Elementary &amp; Secondary Education Programs</b>				<p><i>The House and Senate leadership and the Administration reached an agreement on a continuing resolution (CR), H.R. 1473, to fund the federal government through the end of fiscal year 2011 (September 30, 2011). Overall, the CR cuts approximately \$40 billion in funding from fiscal year 2010 levels, which includes \$12 billion in funding cuts previously enacted in short-term CRs. The funding levels presented here are preliminary and subject to change. According to the Senate Appropriations Committee, "[b]ecause the bill is being funded through a long-term CR, there is no explanatory statement and no accompanying funding table. Therefore, the agencies will have wide discretion over the funding levels for many individual programs, unless the levels were specifically cited in bill language. The bill requires the departments to provide a spending or operating plan for fiscal year 2011 at a level of detail below the account level within 30 days of enactment." As such, funding levels for all federal education programs won't be known until the U.S. Department of Education completes its spending plan. Because the bill language is limited, funding levels for certain programs presented here are based on assumptions by the House or Senate cited in documents issued by the House or Senate Appropriations Committees as well as their staff, but are not binding. For programs not listed here, funding can be assumed to be at the fiscal year 2010 level, although in some instances, funding could be less or not provided at all. The full-year CR also includes a 0.2 percent across-the-board rescission to all non-defense and non-global war on terrorism discretionary (annually appropriated) programs. The total net cut to federal education programs is approximately \$1.9 billion, excluding Pell Grants.</i></p>

\*\* H.R. 1473 provides \$23.002 billion, or \$22.956 billion after applying the rescission, in discretionary appropriations to maintain the maximum award, which is less than the \$23.162 billion provided under the most recent short-term CR through April 15, 2011 (H.R. 1363, Public Law 112-8). The full-year CR eliminates year-round Pell Grants beginning with the 2011-12 award year which saves \$294 million in discretionary program costs.
